The Index Fund Management team comprises 25 fund managers, supported by two analysts. Management oversight is provided by the Global Head of Index Funds. The team has average industry experience of 15 years, of which seven years has been at LGIM, and is focused on achieving the equally important objectives of close tracking and maximising returns.

Higher fund constituents vs. index constituents may be due to liquidity positions, derivatives, short term investments and fractional unit differences.

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# **ESG COMMITMENT**

From diesel emissions to oil spills, there have been many tangible examples in recent years of how failures in the way companies are run can have a harmful impact on the environment, society and investor returns. We believe responsible investing can mitigate the risk of such outcomes and has the potential to improve returns through the integration of environmental, social and governance (ESG) considerations, active ownership and long-term thematic analysis.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL PERFORMANCE**

Carbon dioxide (CO2) is the most significant contributor to greenhouse gas emissions which are driving climate change. Compared to a fund tracking the unadjusted benchmark, the fund will have a different exposure to current and future sources of carbon dioxide emissions.

### CARBON RESERVES INTENSITY

Carbon reserves are fossil fuels (coal, oil and gas) which, if burnt, will become the carbon emissions of the future. To meet global climate change targets, the unabated use of fossil fuels is expected to decline over time.

The figures below are a measure of the size of carbon reserves held by the fund's underlying companies.

The fund has **80%** lower carbon reserves intensity compared to a fund tracking the unadjusted

The difference in carbon reserves intensity means that for every \$1 million invested in the fund, the exposure to carbon reserves through the underlying companies is reduced by an amount equivalent to **2133 tonnes of CO**<sub>2</sub>e compared to having invested in the unadjusted benchmark.

### **CARBON FOOTPRINT**

Following the global Paris Agreement on climate change, companies in all sectors are expected to reduce their emissions to prepare and adapt for a low-carbon economy.

The fund has **19%** higher carbon footprint compared to a fund tracking the unadjusted benchmark. Carbon footprint describes the relationship between the carbon emissions of a company and its EVIC<sup>III</sup>.

The difference in carbon footprint means that the fund has selected companies where, for the same level of EVIC, the associated emissions<sup>iv</sup> are higher by **11 tonnes of CO<sub>2</sub>e** compared to a fund tracking the unadjusted benchmark<sup>v</sup>.

### **GREEN REVENUES**

Green revenues are derived from products and solutions which contribute positively to the transition to a low carbon economy. Investors may benefit from encouraging companies to adapt their revenue models to a low carbon economy.

This fund aims to measure and increase its exposure to companies with green revenues. The figures below indicate green revenues as a percentage of total revenues generated by the companies in the fund

Fund Benchmark

This means that the Fund generated **50%** more green revenues than it would have done if it had invested in the unadjusted benchmark. Note that this **50%** increase figure describes the relative difference between **4%** in the benchmark and **6%** in the fund.

Across all of the assets invested, this increase is equivalent to **\$172 million** additional revenue from green activities.

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### **NOTES**

- $^{\rm i}$  Carbon dioxide equivalent (CO $_2{\rm e})$  is a standard unit to compare the emissions of different greenhouse gases.
- <sup>ii</sup>This metric looks at the embedded carbon in the fossil fuel reserves owned by a company, divided by a company's enterprise value (including cash), to adjust for company size. This represents a carbon reserves intensity score for a company.
- <sup>III</sup> The choice of this metric follows best practice recommendations from the **Task Force on Climate-related Financial Disclosures.**
- iv Data on carbon emissions from a company's operations and purchased energy is used.
- <sup>v</sup>This measure is the result of differences in the weights of companies between the index or the fund and the benchmark, and does not depend on the amount invested in the fund. It describes the relative 'carbon efficiency' of different companies in the benchmark (i.e. how much carbon was emitted per unit of sales) or in the fund, not the contribution of an individual investor in financing carbon emissions.

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

### **RISK AND REWARD PROFILE**



The synthetic risk and reward indicator (SRRI) is based on the historic volatility of the fund's value and it may change in the future.

The fund is in category 5 because it invests in company shares which are sensitive to variations in the stock market. The value of company shares can change substantially over short periods of time.

### **KEY RISKS**
